
INTERVIEW Q&A:

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Preparing for Fall Sports Tryouts

Are you thinking about trying out for a fall sport? Make sure you can take the heat — literally. Summer means fun, friends, and for those in sports, training camps and preparation for tryouts. It brings long days filled with high temperatures. There are many injuries because of the high temperatures like heat stroke.

Heat stroke is when your body overheats and can't cool itself down. Drinking water before, during and after workouts can help to lessen the chance of heat stroke. Some signs that your body is in danger include an elevated body temperature, clammy skin, goose bumps, headache, muscle cramps, and nausea.

Preparing with just a little equipment on, early and late day workouts, and slowly introducing your body to the temperatures are just a few ways to help your body get used to playing in the heat. This includes slowly increasing the intensity of the practices. For example, a football player might run plays in the early morning and later in the evening to avoid the hottest time of the day. They might also run the plays without shoulder pads and helmets. After a several days, they would add some of their uniform. The football players are also taking a lot of breaks to drink water.

Heat Exhaustion or Heat Stroke— A Guide

Heat-related illnesses can be life-threatening. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention describes the following differences between heat exhaustion and heat stroke and how to respond to each.


HEAT EXHAUSTION	HEAT STROKE
Faint or dizzy	Throbbing headache
Excessive sweating	Dizziness, confusion
Cool, pale or clammy skin	No sweating
Nausea or vomiting	Red, hot, dry skin
Rapid, weak pulse	Body temperature above 103°F
Muscle cramps	Nausea or vomiting
	Rapid, strong pulse
	May lose consciousness

- Get to a cooler, air-conditioned place
- Loosen clothes
- Sip water if fully conscious
- Take a cool shower or use cold compresses

CALL 9-1-1

- Take immediate action to cool the person until help arrives


