
first time we had played that course and a few holes cost us the match."

Because of this win, the team was invited in a champions breakfast at the Baierl Center, hosted by the NA administration. In January, the entire team will be honored at the school board meeting.


The team was also invited to tour the PA State Capitol by local House of Representative Arvind Venkat. The team also ordered championship rings as well.

We are the only school in the area doing this and it's because of coaching staff wanting to keep as many players in the program.

Golf has been gaining popularity, in 2023 an estimated 531 million rounds of golf were played in the United States, This championship is sure will help it grow in our district. I was lucky enough to interview Patrick Niven, one of the coaches, who is also a 7th Grade Science teacher here at CMS.


I asked Coach Niven if he had played golf and why he wanted to
