About North Allegheny

North Allegheny is an attractive, professional community twelve miles north of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The District serves the municipalities of Bradford Woods Borough, Franklin Park Borough, Marshall Township and the Town of McCandless, encompassing 48 square miles. North Allegheny is one of the largest suburban school districts in western Pennsylvania, with a K-12 enrollment of over 8,000 students.

Most of the District is suburban-residential with some light industry. Over 1,000 people are employed by the District, making it one of the largest employers in the immediate area. A solid and growing tax base helps maintain economic stability. New housing developments and transferees moving into the area contribute to a steady enrollment.

Curriculum

North Allegheny is a comprehensive high school offering over 200 courses designed to meet the needs, abilities, interests and goals of a diverse student population. Different ability levels are accounted for through phasing of five subject areas. English, science, social studies, mathematics and world language are phased according to difficulty and complexity of skills and content. The majority of AP courses are available to students in grades 11 and 12. Honors Level courses are available in grades 9-12.

Academic Courses

Academic courses are college preparatory level for those students who are college bound or those who have better than average ability and a command of basic skills. Higher level thinking skills are emphasized.

GRADING SCALE: A= 100-90; B= 89-80; C= 79-70; D= 69 -60

Weighting of Grades

An additional weighting factor of .25 is awarded to Advanced Placement Courses. An additional weighting factor of .125 is applied to Honors Courses. On transcripts, these courses are designated as "AP" and "HON".

Honors Courses

North Allegheny offers **73** honors levels courses. These courses have extended content and additional workload. This sets them apart from regular high school courses in the same subject. Honors courses have established prerequisites for admission and are weighted for the purpose of computing QPA. Honors courses are designated (HON) on the transcript. Honors level courses are offered in all academic areas, business, visual arts and music.

Recent Changes/Adjustment to Curriculum Impacting Class of 2023 Graduates

On March 13, 2020, the North Allegheny School District transitioned to remote learning from home. The following provides information on the North Allegheny grading policies for the 4th quarter of the 2019-2020 school year:

Quarter 4 Grading for 2019-2020

- Student grades for the first three quarters (Q1-Q3) were calculated using running total points per current District practice.
- A form of Pass/Fail was utilized for the fourth quarter (Q4). To make this concept work with our current point system, the following calculations were used:
- Q4 assignments were graded as they typically would be throughout the quarter.
- At the end of Q4, each student's grade was overridden by either 100% or 60% of the total points using the following criteria:
 - **PASS:** Students earning at least 61% of the points assigned in Q4 received 100% of the total points available for the quarter.
 - FAIL: Students earning 60% or less of the points assigned in Q4 received 60% of the total points available for the quarter.

Final Grades & Transcript Grades for 2019-2020

- Full-Year Courses: Points Earned Q1-Q4 / Total Points Q1-Q4
- 2nd Semester Courses: Points Earned Q3-Q4 / Total Points Q3-Q4
- Transcripts display the letter grade associated with the full year %

In addition to the new grading policy, it is also important to note most North Allegheny students were unable to sit for an SAT or ACT during the spring and summer of 2020.

School Year 2020-2021

For the 2020-21 school year, students had the option of a hybrid model (attending school in person for two days, virtually for three) or the North Allegheny Cyber Academy (NACA), a full cyber model (five days a week). Students had the ability to move between the two models at the end of each quarter. NACA classes were taught by North Allegheny teachers, using our own curriculum.

School Year 2021-2022

A new grading policy was established to explicitly weight summative and formative assessments within each content area. Summative assessments are cumulative assessments of mastery, and formative assessments are daily classroom assignments or activities.

- All Advanced Placement classes: 80% summative / 20% formative
- Honors Math courses: 80% summative / 20% formative
- Honors English, Social Studies and Science courses: 70% summative / 30% formative
- Academic Math, English, Social Studies, and Science Courses: 70% summative / 30% formative
- Essentials & Standard level courses: 60% summative / 40% formative
- World Language courses: 60% summative / 40% formative



College in High School Courses

College in High School (CHS) offers regional high school students the opportunity to earn both high school and college credit in courses taught right in their high school classrooms. This program provides students the chance to participate in college-level learning experiences before they leave high school, while helping students to establish a collegiate transcript for potential transfer credits in the future. Students are NOT required to take the course for collegiate credit unless they choose to. College in High School are denoted with a CHS on the student's transcript.

Advanced Placement Courses

The Advanced Placement Program gives students the opportunity to pursue college-level studies while still in high school. Students may receive advanced placement and/or credit upon entering college for their score on a nation AP exam given in May. AP courses are weighted in computing QPA. There are 26 AP level courses available to our students. They are noted as AP on the student's transcript. North Allegheny students who take AP classes are not required to take AP exams at the end of the school year, and any student is permitted to register for an AP exam without taking the course.

Special Features

North Allegheny is proud of its numerous extra-curricular offerings. The following are some of the outstanding and diversified student activities: National Honor Society, Air Force JROTC Honor Unit, "Spirit of NA" Tiger Band, Forensics, DECA, drama and musical productions, award-winning student publications (newspaper, yearbook, and literary magazine), Student Council, and NATV cable programming.

Athletes, representing North Allegheny's 24 Varsity sports, are frequent winners at regional, state, and national level competitions. A wide variety of intramural activities supplement the varsity program.

High school students enter the National Merit Program by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (**PSAT/NMSQT**)- a test which serves as an initial screen of approximately 1.5 million entrants each year—and by meeting published program entry/participation requirements.
